TYPES OF ECZEMA

Atopic Dermatitis

Chronic and inflammatory condition that happens when the immune system becomes hyperactive in response to an allergen or irritant inside or outside of the body.

Contact Dermatitis

Happens when the skin touches irritating substances or allergens. Usually appears on the hands, or other parts of the body that came into contact with the irritant/allergen.

Dishydrotic Eczema

Condition that produces small, itchy blisters on the edges of the fingers, toes, palms, and soles of the feet.

Nummular Eczema

Condition where coin-shaped spots develop on the skin, which may become itchy. May be triggered by insect bites, reactions to skin inflammation, or dry skin in the winter.

Seborrheic Dermatitis

Frequently appears on parts of body with abundant oil-producing glands, such as the upper back, nose, and scalp. Also known as "cradle cap" in infants.

Stasis Dermatitis

Occurs when there is inadequate blood flow in the veins and pressure develops, causing fluid to linger in the skin.

- It is possible to have more than one type of eczema at a time.
